2024 Annual Meeting Recap

n a beautiful September day in Sneedville, Tenn., members of Powell Valley Electric Cooperative gathered to attend the 2024 annual meeting. With more than 1,000 in attendance, PVEC's membership was afforded plenty of opportunities for fun and fellowship.

Those who attended the meeting were treated to free services throughout the day, including a hot breakfast, informational vendor tables, bucket truck rides, and entertainment by the bluegrass group Tennessee 90. Children enjoyed games, painting, temporary tattoos and other goodies at the kids' table.

At noon, Board President Roger Ball called the meeting to order, and cooperative employee Danny Sexton gave the invocation. PVEC's director of accounting and finance, John Hoyle, gave the annual financial report. In this report, Hoyle stated that PVEC remains financially sound. Additionally, I gave a report addressing PVEC's operations during the past year. Here are some of the highlights of my report:

GROWTH AND IMPROVEMENTS

Over the past year, PVEC has seen growth in membership as families and

businesses continue to relocate to east Tennessee and southwest Virginia. Even though, we've experienced industrywide material shortages, increased costs and significant delays in delivery times, PVEC has continued to meet the growing demand for new electric services in a

Building new electric lines and maintaining existing ones for reliability are at the core of our business. Since our last annual meeting, PVEC has added nearly 800 new services. To improve reliability, construction crews have built or reconductored nearly 50 miles of overhead and underground lines, and installed or replaced nearly 1,200 poles. These poles are being replaced with taller and stronger ones to enhance resilience against storm damage and accommodate fiber lines. We are also replacing aging equipment in our substations and distribution lines, with plans to upgrade relaying in our substations as well. Additionally, we're also installing animal guards and insulated conductors on new equipment to prevent

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potential outages caused by animals like squirrels and birds, and we continue to commit more resources to our right-of-way program. We are making significant investments in cybersecurity to combat hackers attempting to disrupt the daily business of PVEC. These equipment upgrades, our continued focus on keeping rights-of-way clear, and our significant investments in cybersecurity demonstrate PVEC's commitment to providing the safe and reliable service you expect.

BROADBAND DEPLOYMENT

"Broadband availability has also played a vital role in our Cooperative's growth. In 2019, PVEC partnered with Scott County Telephone Cooperative to form PVEC Fiber, with the goal of building a high-quality, reliable broadband network. This is a costly endeavor, and we are working together to secure grants to help cover deployment expenses. Fortunately, Virginia, Tennessee and the federal government are investing heavily to close the digital divide. Since 2019, we have received over \$40 million in grants that allowed us to build over 1,800 miles of fiber backbone and connect over 10,000 homes and businesses to high-speed broadband. And we're still

not finished. Our most recent grant, from Tennessee Department of Economic & Community Development, is \$18 million to further our efforts to connect members in Hancock and Claiborne counties. We are deeply grateful for our partnership with

Scott County Telephone Cooperative, which has made a significantly positive impact on the communities we serve. And we look forward to the continued benefits of this partnership for many years to come."

IN OUR COMMUNITIES

"PVEC remains actively involved in the communities we serve. Over the past year, Cooperative employees have visited schools to educate younger students about electrical safety and to speak with older students about career opportunities at PVEC. We have hosted electrical safety training for our community's first responders. Each year, PVEC sends four high school students on the Washington Youth Tour to our nation's capital. This trip empowers these students, equipping them with the skills and knowledge to become future leaders in their communities. Additionally, I'm pleased to report that, along with our partners at TVA, we contributed \$20,000 to assist families struggling to pay their electric bills."

THE TVA AND RATES

"I'm sure many of you remember the record cold temperatures that Winter Storm Elliot brought to much of the country in late December 2022. Our power supplier, TVA, experienced increased demand for energy, with both TVA and PVEC setting new records. Again, this past January, our electric grid was tested when extreme cold weather

and snow moved into our service area. Our system peak was just shy of our all-time peak; however, TVA set a new all-time peak. Like PVEC, TVA's service area is experiencing significant growth.

To meet the growing energy needs of the Tennessee Valley,

TVA is building new generating plants. They are also replacing aging coal plants, with less carbon-intensive solutions, such

as natural gas plants, solar, wind and battery storage. Building and replacing power plants is a costly undertaking, but it is necessary to ensure the reliability that we expect. To fund the immediate and future construction of power plants, TVA has announced a 5.25% increase to wholesale rates that will begin Oct. 1.

On a larger scale, our industry and PVEC itself continue to face significant inflation in the cost of goods, materials and services necessary to support operations. For example, items such as transformers, conductors and breakers have essentially doubled, and in some cases even tripled, in price since 2020. In 2019, PVEC began passing through a partnership credit from TVA directly to our members. While many utilities chose to retain this credit, PVEC was positioned to pass these savings on to our members, as we believed it was in the best interest of our community. Due to rising inflationary pressures, the pass-through of the partnership credit will conclude at the end of September. This necessary step is crucial to maintaining PVEC's financial health and ensuring reliable service.

So, how does this affect residential members? For the average residential member, TVA's 5.25% wholesale rate increase, along with ending the partnership credit, will result in an increase of \$6.35 per month on a residential energy bill. Just over \$4 of this increase goes to TVA, while PVEC retains the remainder.

It is important to put these changes into context. Even with the increase, PVEC 's residential rates remain far below the national average. In fact, our residential rates are 29% below the national average, and I would be remiss if I

didn't mention that this is the first increase in the energy portion of the residential charge in over 20 years.

While rates may change from time to time, one thing remains the same: We are committed to improving the lives of our members by providing the best possible service at the lowest possible price."

By observing a few simple precautions, you may prevent an accident and ensure your loved ones enjoy a safe and happy Thanksgiving.

The kitchen is the place where everyone gathers to catch up, reminisce on beloved memories and snack on delicious leftovers. Take notice of the many kitchen appliances that are being utilized. Keep small children away from hot surfaces, and remember to keep pot and pan handles turned away from walkways to avoid dangerous spills.

With many appliances working overtime, it is easy to overload electrical outlets. Overburdened outlets can overheat, causing electrical fires. To prevent this, plug one appliance into an outlet at a time or use surge protectors.

When preparing to use any appliances, inspect the electrical cords. Replace or repair any appliances with damaged cords or plugs. Additionally, keep electrical cords away from heat sources, such as stoves or toaster ovens.
