Safety Tips

Once the kids head back to school, it's likely

your house will sit empty for most of the day — unless you have pets. Unfortunately, pets too often express their loneliness by tearing up the house.

If you can, consider designing a pet-friendly space, such as a spare bedroom or garage, just for your beloved pet. This will give them a place to play, rest and keep the destruction to a minimum.

Here's how to get started:

1. Clear the area of any items you don't want your pet to chew or scratch. Remove valuables and materials you want to keep or use. Also look for paint cans, cleaning chemicals, tools and anything with sharp edges that could harm your pet. If you don't have anywhere else to store these items, invest in a large storage container that your pet could not possibly open.

2. Cover electrical outlets and any exposed wiring. Remove or cover electrical cords. If they cannot be covered or removed, attach them high on walls so your pet can't reach them to chew or get tangled in.

3. Scour the floors and walls, leaving no trace of spilled poisons like antifreeze, gas, oil and paint. This also will remove harmful odors.

4. Lock all windows and doors, and securely cover any holes or vents that your pet could squeeze through in an effort to get outdoors.

5. Lay an inexpensive, easy-toclean laminate floor so you can mop up pet accidents. Concrete is porous, so it absorbs liquids and smells. Wood is absorbent, too, and also scratches easily.

6. Make the space comfortable. Install insulation if your pet's room is in the garage, so it won't get too hot or cold. Furnish the room with a big, soft, washable bed, a food-and-water area, toys, scratching posts and even music.

Trimming Trees: A Key to Lower Electric Rates

id you know that trimming trees around power lines can keep your electric rates lower? Overgrown trees lead to power outages and costly repairs, so our team at Powell Valley Electric Cooperative works hard to maintain the growth of vegetation near our infrastructure. Here are a few ways these investments save you money in the long run:

Prevention of power outages. One of the primary reasons why tree trimming is essential is its ability to prevent power outages. Trees growing too close to powerlines will cause outages when branches come into contact with the lines during storms or high winds. By regularly trimming trees, we can minimize the risk of branches falling onto the lines and causing power outages. This proactive approach to tree maintenance helps ensure a more reliable electrical grid, reducing the need for emergency repairs and ultimately lowering maintenance costs.

Improved reliability. Trimming trees around powerlines not only prevents outages but also improves service reliability. Overgrown trees and branches can create intermittent faults, resulting in brief power interruptions. By keeping trees trimmed and maintaining a clear distance between branches and power lines, utilities can provide a more stable and reliable power supply, improving customer satisfaction and reducing the need for costly equipment repairs or replacements. **Decreased maintenance costs.** Regular tree trimming near power lines leads to decreased maintenance costs to your cooperative. When trees grow too close to powerlines, they could require more frequent inspections and trimming, which can be time-consuming and expensive. By maintaining a safe distance between trees and powerlines through proactive trimming practices, we reduce the frequency of maintenance visits, lowering labor and equipment costs. These savings can then be passed on to our consumers, contributing to lower electric rates.

Mitigation of safety hazards. Trimming trees near power lines also helps mitigate safety hazards. Overgrown trees can pose a significant risk to public safety if they come into contact with power lines, potentially leading to electrocution or fires. By proactively managing vegetation around power lines, utilities can minimize these risks, ensuring safety for both the community and our crews. This reduces the likelihood of accidents and the associated costs of emergency response and potential liability claims.
